Not-for-profit organisations can apply for R&D funding to scope a new idea which enables them to work together with other organisations or experts **outside their usual practice**, or to enable them to undertake active research into areas they would not normally have the time or money to explore.

They particularly welcome ideas that take the perspective of people at the receiving end of activities or services, whether as audiences, participants or clients.

They are also looking for ideas that demonstrate a cross-sectoral approach.

If projects are specifically local they must be of a kind that have not been implemented elsewhere and which can set a precedent for emulation in other places, or serve as a national pilot.

The funds available are modest in scale and **competition is likely to be strong**. As a guide, it is expected that grants will average between £10,000 and £25,000. The Main Fund is responsive to requests for support across the broad range of their interests, which are: the arts, education and learning, the natural environment and enabling disadvantaged people to participate more fully in society.

Funding so widely creates a lot of competition. In 2010 they received around 2,900 eligible applications to the Main Fund and made 270 grants totalling £21.4m. The average grant size was £79,000.

To ensure that they can respond to so many requests, the application process is in two stages. They will acknowledge receipt of your first stage application within a week of receiving it and email you within a month to say whether they would like to take it to a second stage or decline to support it. If they invite you to proceed to the second stage, they may ask you for additional information in order to clarify and expand on what you have already told them.

Santander Foundation

The Santander Foundation funding must directly help disadvantaged people through one or both of these charitable priorities: Education and training; Financial capability

Education and training

This could be any activity disadvantaged people undertake where they improve their confidence in a skill or their understanding of a subject. This does not have to be formal training or lead to a qualification, although those activities would be eligible too.

Financial capability

This priority covers activities which help disadvantaged people understand how to manage their money. It could include budgeting skills, accessing affordable credit as well as managing the challenges that arise from being a carer, unemployment, disability or relationship break up.

Grants of up to £10,000 can be awarded anywhere in the UK. The average grant is £4,000. All funding is for one off donations. They do not offer multi-year funding. Grants are available to buy tangible items such as equipment or training materials. Grants are also available to fund project costs such as sessional worker fees, salaries, room hire or other costs incurred in the delivery of the charitable priorities.

Organisations with charitable status for their work within the UK can apply. This includes registered charities, Friendly Societies, Industrial & Provident Societies registered under charitable not membership rules). Community Interest Companies or not-for-profit organisations are not funded unless they are also registered charities.

Hedley Foundation

The main objective of the Trustees' grant-making is to assist and encourage development and change.

Main objective (currently about 70% of the Foundation's budget):

- **Young people:** their education, recreation, support, training, health and welfare,

The Big Tree Plant

The aim is to support community, not for profit, groups to plant one million trees in towns, cities and residential areas throughout England over four years (2011 to 2015).

Grants of between £500 and £25,000, for up to 75% of costs, are available to projects that:

- plant trees in neighbourhoods in England where people live and work;
- involve the local community and provide benefits to people in the neighbourhood;
- plant individual street trees, small groups of trees in greenspaces, or other neighbourhood tree planting; and
- have in place a method for ensuring the trees are cared for in the future.

They have revised the application round and guidance notes following the first application round:

- Clarification of the scheme's aims, its competitive nature and the need for applicants to 'make the case' particularly how their project will improve the environment where tree cover is low and /or where deprivation is high;
- A greater emphasis on selecting smaller, more robust and inexpensive trees for most situations;
- A better indication of the grant scheme's budget and how it will achieve value for money;
- An application form that should work better than the previous version.

The fund can cover the costs of goods and services such as: trees and material for tree planting; preparatory work such as utility searches, test pits, and planning applications; local community engagement; contract labour for running the project and undertaking works; time of staff spent on running the project; expert advice; hire of machinery; and small items such as tools or protective clothing for tree planting - however, these must remain the property of the group or organisation.

Local authorities cannot apply directly but projects in partnership with local authorities are welcome.

Church Urban Fund - Mustard Seed Programme

Provide grants to enable churches and faith-based organisations, working in very deprived communities, to engage in social action through supporting them to initiate or develop community work. This will then enable groups to either undertake larger pieces of work or significantly improve the existing provision.

This aims to provide grants of up to £5,000.

The project must be directly tackling the effects of profound poverty and should be working in the 10% most deprived areas in England.

Mustard Seed Grants can pay for specific activities but not for on-going revenue expenditure, existing salary costs, deficit funding, or retrospective spending. It is expected that work supported under the Mustard Seed Programme will grow into more substantive or developed activities.

This is a rolling programme where there are no deadline dates.

The grant requested should typically represent at least a third of the total funding required.

The Sport England Small Grants Programme has been set up to support local community sport projects which seek to increase participation, sustain participation or develop opportunities for people to excel at their chosen sport.
